

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
Clinical Education

Community Health Worker (CHW) Program

It's been an exciting year for Maryland CHWs as the Maryland General Assembly passed Senate Bill 163 creating a CHW Advisory Committee. The Committee will be tasked with making recommendations for the certification of CHWs and CHW Training Programs. ESAHEC provided testimony in support of the bill and participated in stakeholder meetings and calls to advocate for the passage of the bill.



ESAHEC participated alongside AHEC West as a panelist at the Maryland Dental Action Coalition's (MDAC) annual conference on June 18th. Ms.

Widmaier provided an overview of CHWs and discussed the training and education of CHWs in Maryland in the session entitled Community Health Workers: Critical Link to Better Health. **Panelists:** Lisa Widmaier, ESAHEC's Lead Trainer, Catie Wampole, Program Coordinator at Mountain Health Alliance, and Dorian Birkholz, Oral Health CHW at AHEC West



CHW training continues to be an important mission of ESAHEC. A cohort of six (6) CHWs were trained in early 2018 with funding through the Maryland Agricultural Education and Rural Development Assistance Fund (MAERDAF) and the Rural Maryland Council (RMC).

Jobs In Health Care - EARN

In October 2017, the Department of Labor and Licensing Regulation (DLLR) granted the Employment Advancement Right Now (EARN) Eastern Shore Ready to Care partnership a third round of funding of \$181,138.00 in order to continue employment advancement on the Eastern Shore. The program participants consists of healthcare entities throughout the nine counties on the Eastern Shore who are dedicated to helping individuals secure job placement and/or advancement and filling the employment gap within the industry. The grant funds awarded will be used to offer basic training and certification to forty five (45) Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs). Credential stacking (such as phlebotomy, Certified Medicine Aide, Pharmacy Technician, EKG Technician, and Dialysis Technician) will also be available to currently or previously funded EARN. In order to meet the increasing needs for mental health skills in the workplace, the EARN program will also fund Mental Health First Aid certification to seventy five (75) CNAs. To date the program has trained and placed seventy six (78) CNAs throughout the Shore.

Geriatrics and Gerontology Education and Research (GGEAR) Program

Geriatric funding for this year was supported by a University System of Maryland Redeployment grant to the Geriatrics and Gerontology Education and Research (GGEAR) program at University of Maryland, Baltimore under the direction of Reba Cornman, MSW and Johns Hopkins Geriatric Workforce Enhancement Program (GWEP), and of Jane Marks, RN, MS, FNGNA.



Community Health Workers (CHWs) from across the shore discussed a typical day in the work of a CHW, their biggest challenges, and some inspiring patient stories. The panel presentation was a highlight of the conference on April 6, 2018.

Two (2) half-day workshops were held at the Eastern Shore Hospital Center in Cambridge reaching 155 healthcare professionals including social workers, case managers, nurses, and community health workers. Each program included presentations by experts and concluded with panel discussions. Ninety-nine (99) percent of attendees evaluated the programs as Good to Excellent. Session topics included:

Geriatric Assessment Interdisciplinary Team (GAIT) Training

This past year funding from the program at University of Maryland, Baltimore supported Five (5) Geriatric Assessment Interdisciplinary Team (GAIT) training projects and a Multidisciplinary Clinical Skills Workshop: Assessment Tools of Older Adults.

HealthSouth Chesapeake Rehab hosted 12 GAIT students on December 5, 2017.

A total of **66** Students representing various disciplines including: Physician Assistant (**20**), Physical Therapy (**13**), Nursing (**12**), Social Work (**9**), Pharmacy (**8**), Dental Hygiene (**2**), Speech-Language Pathology (**1**) and Exercise Science (**1**). Ninety-one (**91%**) percent of attendees rated the overall quality of the GAIT Program as EXCELLENT. One hundred percent (**100%**) of students reported enhanced clinical skills, knowledge, and cultural competency in geriatrics and rural areas at the close of the GAIT Program.

Bringing Health Insurance Opportunities to the Eastern Shore

ESAHEC in its 5th year with Seedco and the Maryland Health Benefit Exchange, continues working to implement the Affordable Care Act on the Eastern Shore of Maryland.

In an open enrollment period that was about half as long as a year ago, the number of consumers served by a ESAHEC Navigator rose by **10%**.





Who We Are, What We Do


